
She and her staff loved the book and purchased a copy for their school. Melinda said that after reading the book to the children, filling a bucket became a part of their daily vocabulary.

Og treated everyone he met with kindness. At some point in his life, he developed a core belief that each person on earth is a miracle. He was a man who spent the last decades of his life filling buckets with his wisdom and compassion.

This gentle man was not ashamed to show emotion; he nearly loses his composure as he tells a moving story about the time he took a taxi to a television station for a guest appearance.

He asked Ray, the taxi-driver, who had picked him up at the airport, to let the meter run, and join him in the studio. Well, Ray reached back and put the flag *down* and accompanied Og into the building where he was introduced as, "my buddy, Ray" to the show's producer, who was a bit surprised to see Og in the company of a black taxi driver dressed in T-shirt and jeans. Nevertheless, Ray was seated in the front row and was shown the same kindness again that morning before Og's two radio broadcasts in other sections of the city.

When it was time for lunch, Ray insisted on taking Og to "his part of town" where, Og claims he was served "the best hamburger" he'd ever had. Ray insisted on paying the check and as he drove his new "buddy" back to the airport he said, "I ain't never going to forget this day." When Og asked him why, Ray responded, "You made me feel important — today was the first time in my life I ever felt important." He then stepped close to Og and hugged him and said, "I love you Mr. Og." and Og, hugging him back replied, "I love you, too, Ray."

It was a bucketfilling moment that neither man ever forgot.
