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every unremarkable one. I see bucket fillers who truly care about each child. When a child achieves something in a bucket filler's classroom, their achievement is recognized with enthusiasm and love.

I remember hearing the story of a teacher who had taught for many years. She attended a dinner party and was seated next to the CEO of a large international company. The CEO, impressed with this teacher, asked, "Why on earth have you spent all these years teaching? What have you made? You sure don't make much money." To which this teacher responded,

"I'll tell you what I make every day.

I make kids feel loved.

I make them feel that learning is fun.

I make kids wonder and appreciate.

I make them appreciate the wonder of books.

I make them see the good in others.

I make them learn to listen and respect others.

More than anything, I make a difference.
